Purpose: To increase the science and mathematics background and communication skills of Native American students who are interested in preparing for careers as health professionals (in medicine, dentistry, osteopathy, biomedical sciences, nursing, pharmacy, health, and allied health professions).

Eligibility: Native American students interested in health careers are eligible to apply for this program if they are presently in their senior year of high school or freshmen year of college, at least 18 years of age, and have completed at least 2 years of algebra and 2 science courses, while maintaining at least a 2.5 GPA. Graduation must be complete and verification of acceptance to a college will be required by the beginning of the program.

Financial Data: Each participant is provided with free room, board, and tuition during the 8 week program, as well as round trip air transportation. In addition, participants receive a \$500 stipend.

Duration: 8 weeks during the summer.

Special Features: The Headlands program, held on the OU Norman campus, provides a science and mathematics enrichment and reinforcement program, consisting of mini-block course in biology, chemistry, physics, and mathematics.

Application: May be completed online, downloaded from the internet, or by written request.

Number Awarded: Varies; approximately 30 each year.

Deadline: March of each year.

Purpose: To provide financial assistance to Native American students who need compensatory preprofessional education to qualify for enrollment or reenrollment in a health professions school.

Eligibility: Native American students eligible to apply for the scholarships are those who have:

- Completed a high school education or high school equivalency and need compensatory preprofessional education to enroll in a health professions school.
- Acquired a baccalaureate degree and need compensatory preprofessional education to qualify for enrollment in a health professions school
- Been enrolled in a health professions school but are no longer enrolled and need preprofessional education to qualify for readmission to a health professions school. For the purposes of this program, “compensatory preprofessional education” means any preprofessional education necessary to compensate for deficiencies in a student’s prior education in order to qualify for enrollment in a health professions school.

Areas of study include: pre-dietetics, premedical technology, pre-nursing, pre-pharmacy, pre-physical therapy, pre social work and pre engineering.

Financial Data: Awards range from \$5,000 to \$12,000 per year, depending upon the funds available and the academic needs of the recipient.

Duration: Up to 2 years

Number awarded: Varies, approximately 80 each year.

Purpose: To provide financial support for American Indian students interested in pursuing postsecondary education in pre-medicine or pre-dentistry.

Eligibility: Applicants must be American Indians or Alaska Natives: be high school graduates or the equivalent; have the capacity to complete a health professions course of study; and be enrolled or accepted for enrollment in a baccalaureate degree program for pre-medicine or its equivalent.

Applicants must provide verification from a school official (preferably for an undergraduate curriculum leading to a bachelor's degree in pre-medicine and represent 12 credit hours per semester/quarter/term, or the equivalent of full-time at the applicant's school). Selection is based on academic performance, work experience, and community background, faculty/employer recommendations, and applicant's reasons for seeking the scholarship. Priority funding considerations are given to students who are currently receiving a Health Professions Scholarship and/or who have completed a compensatory/pre-professional education program under the Health Professions Preparatory Scholarship Programs for Indians.

Financial Data: The level of the scholarship benefits (i.e. stipend, travel reimbursement, cost of books) is contingent on the availability of funds appropriated each fiscal year by Congress and, therefore, is subject to change each year. Students receive approximately \$800 per month for living expenses (including room and board); in addition to the stipend, the program covers tuition and related fees, books, travel, and other necessary educational expenses. Daily commuting costs are reimbursed.

Duration: 1 year, may be renewed for up to three additional years.

Number awarded: Varies, approximately 60 each year.

Deadline: February of each year.

Purpose: To provide financial support to students enrolled in health professions and allied health professions programs.

Eligibility: Applicants must be high school graduates or the equivalent and be enrolled in a full time study leading to a degree in a health related professions school within the United States. Even though non-Indian students may apply for this program, the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (p.L. 94-437) requires that priority for the awards be given to Indian applicants. Both the number of Indian applicants and the level of appropriations limit the availability of scholarship awards to non-Indians.

Financial Data: The stipend generally ranges from \$7,000 to \$12,000 per year; the average grant is \$8,500. Funds are to be used for tuition, books, and other necessary expenses.

Duration: 1 year, renewable

Special Features: Awards are made in the following categories: nutrition, dietetics, health administration, social work, physical therapy, medical records, and other related health areas.

Limitations: Upon completion of their program of study, recipients are required to serve for a payback period (1 year for each year of scholarship support).

Number awarded: Varies, generally, 400 each year.

Deadline: February of each year.

Purpose: To provide financial assistance to Native Americans who are studying a health-related curriculum in graduate school and would be willing to work at an IHS facility upon graduation.

Eligibility: Eligible to apply are Native Americans who are enrolled as full-time students in the final year of a program leading to a degree in allopathic or osteopathic medicine, dentistry, or other health profession. They must be eligible for appointment in the regular or reserve corps of the Public Health Service or for civilian service in the IHS.

Financial data: The loan/loan forgiveness program awards range from \$3,000 to \$75,000. Each year, a total of \$4 million is distributed through the program.

Duration: At least 2 years; the exact amount of service time required depends on the amount awarded or forgiven.

Limitations: Recipients must agree to serve for a predetermined period at a facility the Indian Health

Service has designated as a retention/recruitment site or in a designated specialty at a site with an appropriate position.

Purpose: To assist Oklahoma's rural communities as approved by PMTC and to provide financial assistance (through a scholarship loan forgiveness program) to residents of the State of Oklahoma who are enrolled in a medical college and who have as their goal the practice of primary care medicine in rural Oklahoma.

Eligibility: Participant agrees to practice in a qualified Oklahoma rural community. Participant must be currently enrolled in (or has been accepted into) a medical college and plans to do internship/residency in a primary care specialty. Participant has no other assistance which has a conflicting service obligation requirement. Must be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

Amount: \$60,000.00

* \$15,000 each for first, second, third, and fourth years. Payable monthly.

Service Obligation: One year of practice in a qualified Oklahoma rural community for each year of scholarship loan. (Must practice at least two years for any credit to be given.)

Penalty: If the medical school graduate goes into a residency program other than in primary care, payback of three times the principal and accrued interest may be due immediately.

If the physician decides not to repay his/her obligated scholarship loan by practicing medicine in rural Oklahoma, he/she may be required to repay three times the principal amount, plus interest in accordance with the terms of the contract.

Eligibility: Pre-doctoral IRTA Fellows- candidates must be enrolled in a doctoral degree program in a biomedical, behavioral, or related science in good academic standing. It is expected that applicants be engaged in training directly related to the dissertation phase of their pre-doctoral education or that they be students who have been accepted into graduate, doctoral, or medical degree programs and have written permission from their school to either delay entrance for up to one year or to interrupt their current schooling and return within one year to their degree granting program.

Post-doctoral IRTA Fellows candidates must possess a doctoral degree in a biomedical, behavioral, or related science, or possess university certification showing that they meet all the requirements leading to such a doctorate and have 5 or fewer years of professional level, relevant post-doctoral research experience and up to two additional years not oriented toward research. For medical doctors, this excludes any time spent serving internships and residency programs

Candidates must be US citizens or have alien resident status.
